Flipped Classroom

① This lesson plan is made up of two worksheets, the Preparatory Worksheet and the Main Worksheet, so that it can optionally be taught using the flipped classroom approach.

A flipped classroom is where you, as an ESL teacher, give your students materials to study at home first. Then, in class, instead of teaching new content, you help students understand and use what they learnt at home through activities and discussions. It makes class time more interactive.

Preparatory Worksheet

① **②** 20-30 minutes

Vocabulary Introduction: Identify the correct definition for each phrasal verb.

① This exercise introduces phrasal verbs related to money matters. Students read each sentence and then choose the correct definition from the three options. Learning through context improves retention and encourages students to use these verbs appropriately.

• Remember that 'sbd' means 'somebody' and 'sth' means 'something'

Read each of the sentences. Take note of the underlined phrasal verb, and then read the three possible definitions. Choose which of the definitions best fits the phrasal verb by context.

Gap Fill: Put the phrasal verbs in the gaps. You may need to conjugate them.

① This activity checks students' understanding of the phrasal verbs as students need to use them in a new context. Remind students that the verb tense may change based on the sentence context; this is to 'conjugate' the verbs.

Main Worksheet

① **(** 40-60 minutes

Kickoff: How many words related to the verb 'spend' can you think of?

① This warm-up activity gets students to think about the topic of spending. If you have taught the lesson plan called Master Your Finances, your this will be great revision. It encourages them to use prior knowledge of vocabulary related to 'spend'.

Vocabulary Game: Read the instructions for the game and play it together.

① This activity is a fun way to use their new phrasal verbs in context. It also helps them understand how these verbs might be used in real-life situations. Encourage friendly competition to keep the energy high. You may consider a small prize for the winning team.

If there are more than two people, get into pairs or groups. For each box, your objective is to name something that corresponds with the phrase. For example, if your objective was to 'name something that is usually expensive', one answer could be 'a new car'. You may play for the fastest answer, or for the best, or for the highest number of relevant answers.

Quiz Creation: Create a quiz as a group. Try to use the phrasal verbs you have learnt and other financial vocabulary you know.



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① Creating a quiz together is a fun way to get students to use what they've learnt from a different perspective. This activity can also make excellent homework, especially if you have a shorter class time and have not used the flipped classroom approach.

Speaking: Complete the questions with the missing prepositions. Then, answer them.

① This activity helps students apply the phrasal verbs in real-life contexts. The gap-fill element means that students will have to think back to the Preparatory Worksheet to find the right prepositions, aiding memory. Encourage students to elaborate on their answers.

- 1. What's the last thing you splashed out a lot of money on?
- 2. Do you have something you'd like to pay off soon?
- 3. What advice would you give to someone who's struggling to get by?
- 4. Have you ever been ripped off when buying something?
- 5. What's the biggest thing you've ever saved up to buy?
- 6. What could you never cut back on?
- 7. Have you ever managed to buy something that was supposed to be sold out?
- 8. Are you the type of person who usually pays others back immediately?
- 9. Whose was the last gift you chipped in for?
- 10. Have you ever spent an entire day shopping <u>around</u> for something?

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Extra Activity: Get students to role-play one of the phrasal verbs.

① If you have extra time, a role-play activity is a great way to use speaking and listening skills while putting today's vocabulary to use.

Split students into pairs and give each pair a scenario where they need to make a financial decision. For example, they might need to chip in for a birthday present, or decide what to cut back on to save some money. Then, get them to role-play the scenario.

Once they are done, they can share their conversations with the group.

Remember to reward students for correct use of the phrasal verbs.
