It's always a good idea to prepare an answer yourself for each of the questions in case they need some help.

- 2. Have you ever been turned away from somewhere? e.g. a club, a restaurant that was fully booked
- 3. Do you often have to turn back in the morning because you forgot something at home? e.g. your phone
- 4. Have you ever discovered that a friend was trying to turn you against another friend? e.g. a manipulative person
- 5. When do you absolutely love turning the music up? e.g. when in the car, when you are cleaning
- 6. Can you think of one thing you believed as a child that turned out not to be true? e.g. that lions live in England
- 7. As a child, did you have any toys that turned into something else? e.g. Transformers, toys that fold into balls
- 8. Have you ever not turned up to class or work? e.g. because you overslept
- 9. When you're watching TV, what programme always makes you turn over? e.g. the golf because you find it boring
- 10. What do you leave turned on at home (or turned on standby) that you probably shouldn't? e.g. the TV
- 11. Do you know anybody who's really turned their life around? e.g. a friend who made a big change
- 12. Have you ever turned off the TV in the middle of a programme because you couldn't watch anymore? e.g. a horror
