Introduction:

Vocabulary Focus:

Ask and answer the questions as a group.

1. Which adjectives have a more positive meaning?
2. Which adjectives have a more negative meaning?
3. Which adjectives can you use as a compliment?
4. Which adjectives can you use as an insult?
5. Which adjectives would you use to describe your friends?
6. Do you know any more adjectives you could add to the list?

Speaking Activity:

Play the describing game with your classmates.

- Imagine different people who you can describe with each adjective.
- Make a sentence about that person without using the specific adjective.
- For example, you could say, "Brenda doesn't like working or studying or doing anything!"
- Ask your classmates which adjective they think fits the person.
- If you talk about real people, be careful not to offend anyone!

Speaking Activity II:

Say something nice about your classmates!

- One student volunteers to go first.
- All the other students must take a small piece of paper.
- They will write, "I think [name] would make a good [profession] because he/she is very..."
- e.g., "I think Sam would make a good doctor because he is very kind."
- You have to say something nice!
- When everyone has written on their paper, share your answers with the group.
