- Option B: allowing students to complete the quiz in their own time, they should be allowed 40 minutes (just under a minute per question) leaving 15 minutes for answers and feedback

#### Two-hour class

- Option A: giving the questions directly after each question, you should allow between 120 and 150 seconds for each question (10 seconds to read the question, 90 seconds of discussion, and 20-50 seconds to give each right answer.
- Option B: allowing students to complete the quiz in their own time, they should be allowed 90 minutes (about one minute thirty per question) leaving 25 minutes for answers and feedback
