Kickoff: Read and answer the questions about you.

This activity is designed to ask the students three questions that they are probably already familiar with. This will help them to understand the question words later in the class.

- 1. What is your name?
- 2. When is your birthday?
- 3. Where do you live?

Vocabulary Focus I: Read about <u>question words</u> and their use.

① This activity introduces the nine main question words with pictures to aid memory and examples. Below, you will find useful translations for other languages to help you if your students have almost no previous English knowledge.

We use **question words** to ask questions in English. These words can help us to know more about people, things, places, time, reasons, and more. Each question word has its own use:

ES: Usamos palabras interrogativas para hacer preguntas en inglés. Estas palabras pueden ayudarnos a saber más sobre personas, cosas, lugares, tiempo, razones y más. Cada palabra interrogativa tiene su propio uso.

PT: Usamos palavras interrogativas para fazer perguntas em inglês. Essas palavras podem nos ajudar a saber mais sobre pessoas, coisas, lugares, tempo, razões e mais. Cada palavra interrogativa tem seu próprio uso.

FR: Nous utilisons des mots interrogatifs pour poser des questions en anglais. Ces mots peuvent nous aider à en savoir plus sur les personnes, les choses, les lieux, le temps, les raisons, et plus encore. Chaque mot interrogatif a son propre usage.

DE: Wir verwenden Fragewörter, um Fragen auf Englisch zu stellen. Diese Wörter können uns helfen, mehr über Menschen, Dinge, Orte, Zeit, Gründe und mehr zu erfahren. Jedes Fragewort hat seine eigene Verwendung.

CH: 我们使用疑问词在英语中提问。这些词可以帮助我们更多地了解人,事,地,时,因,和更多。每个疑问词都有其自己的用途。



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① Read the questions with your students and encourage them to answer where possible.



Who: To ask about people e.g. "Who is your favourite singer?"



Why: To ask about reasons e.g. "Why do you like the summer?"



Where: To ask about places and directions e.g. "Where is your school?"



What: To ask about things e.g. "What is your favourite colour?"



When: To ask about time and dates e.g. "When is your birthday?"



How: To ask about the way things are / people feel e.g. "How are you today?"



Which: To ask about a choice e.g. "Which do you prefer, cats or dogs?"



Whose: To ask about possession e.g. "Whose is this sweater?"



How much / How many: To ask about quantities and amounts e.g. "How much does this cost?"

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Pronunciation: Repeat the question words with your teacher.

/w/ sound: what, when, where, why, which

/h/ sound: who, whose, how, how much / how many

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Speaking II:

Ask questions about the pictures below.

① This final activity, which you can skip if you do not have time or your students need extra help, encourages students to ask questions about the things they see. Stronger students can use the present continuous. Some example questions are given below.

e.g. How does she feel?

More examples for the first picture: Why is she tired? What is on her bed? Who is she? What is on her computer? Where is she? Whose are those clothes?

Examples for the second picture: Where is he? What is in his hand? What is he doing? What is he cooking? How does he feel? How many tomatoes are there? Why is he smiling?
